

(or out of Alan's pocket when I took his jeans off the line), and was glad I didn't find the four-inch spider hiding until just a few days before we left.

However, the darkness in Liberia also means more serious dangers. Even on the ELWA campus we were very careful not to walk about alone in the evening as there had been recent machete attacks, and the house we were living in had already been

Generator Control Systems

The new computer control system Alan installed allows two of the ELWA generators to run in parallel for more capacity, and can switch



between the generators without turning off the electricity. This will provide efficient 24-hour electricity on the campus without wearing out just one generator, and will allow upgrades in campus security. Most importantly, these improvements will provide Radio ELWA with reliable electricity for broadcasting the message of Christ to Monrovia and throughout Liberia. As frightening as physical darkness can be, spiritual darkness untouched by Jesus, the Light of Life, is

infinitely worse.

In addition to the control system installation, we praise the Lord for enabling almost a full overhaul of the powerhouse. Alan had the help of Steve Kejr, a colleague from the SIM-US office, and Mel, his brother from Kansas, along with the ELWA

maintenance staff. Due to a failed part and lack of time, Alan was not able to install a control system on ELWA's third generator. The ELWA management team is asking when he could make a follow-up trip in the near future.

While Alan worked on generators, I spent my time teaching science to upper elementary students at the ELWA Academy and writing curriculum for the second through fourth grades in the areas of Bible, science, and social studies. It was such a joy to spend time with teachers committed to sharing Christ

through their teaching, even in much less than ideal circumstances. At the Academy, preschool and kindergarten classes contain 40-plus children crowded into one room, and curriculum and teaching resources are extremely sparse.

The Darkness of War

Before we arrived, the darkness of civil war had enveloped Liberia for fifteen years. The country is just in the beginning stages of recovery. We spent

hours listening as old friends of Alan's recounted stories of a war in which civilians went totally unprotected, and we rejoiced at the faith and joy we

saw in their faces and heard in their prayers. Africans can sing like no others, and I stood with tears when the church we attended rang out with, "Because He lives, I can face tomorrow; because He lives, all fear is gone..."

In Liberia, we saw firsthand the Light of Life shining in the lives of our brothers and sisters in Christ, and we have come back blessed. We long for the day we can return to work with them, specifically in the restoration of
