## Astronauts & Isolation Pods

In September, a team from Baylor University College of Medicine in Houston, Texas, and representatives from USAID arrived at ELWA to install a containerized isolation pod on the new

hospital campus. An eightfoot wide shipping container unfolded before our eyes to a width of 25 feet. Inside was a fully equipped mini-



isolation pod for treating patients with contagious diseases without exposing the regular wards. Alan was on hand to assist with the hookup, and Cheri

became a medical doctor on retiring from NASA. He was a doctor in Liberia during the Ebola epidemic.

emphasis on traumatic stress experienced by military and police. Liberia is the pilot country for this version, which also comes from the American Bible Society. Small groups led by facilitators trained at ELWA complement the programs.

In Liberian English, the program reaches into the hearts of people traumatized by a brutal civil war with the hope of Jesus' healing and forgiveness, to many who don't believe forgiveness is possible.

## On the Mend

This fall Cheri was ill for two months with malaria and "mono" (mononucleosis). It's not uncommon when someone is sick with malaria for another "opportunistic" virus to set in as well. Several rounds of treatment finally dealt with the malaria, which then gave her the chance to tackle the mono.


